Recently, I got a list of "20 Things to Give Up For Lent" through Facebook. It is a devotional from the pastor of The Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Old Bridge, New Jersey. Ironically, Pastor Nola will be preaching about giving up specific "vices" during Lent. I thought I'd write about a few behaviors that Pastor Nola will not be addressing on Sunday mornings.

My choice for this week is "impatience". I'm sure this came to mind because of the hour and a half it took me to download new Windows Office software. Typically I'm a fairly patient person, but I do get a little stressed when things don't work like I think they should. The devotional offered 3 areas where we can address our impatience: patience with God; patience with ourselves; and patience with others. Most of us tend to be pretty patient with ourselves, right? We know our limitations. We are content to function within the parameters of our "comfort zone". Is that the kind of patience God wants of us? Or maybe He would like us to set our goals beyond what we think we can do and WORK toward those goals. Being patient with oneself is really allowing time to grow and develop to our fullest potential. Real growth happens over time. Patience to do just what we know we can does not help us to grow.

When we think of patience, most of us visualize being patient with others. The patience of a parent is repeatedly tested by their children. A spouse can be the one who "gets on my last nerve". Most of the time, we are patient with strangers, too, right? How many times can you catch yourself saying, "just go!" or "make up your mind!" to the driver in the lane ahead of you. I'm pretty sure God would prefer that we refrain from those types of impatient behaviors. He tells us over and over in the Bible that we should put the needs of others before ourselves. In most situations, if we are patient we discover why the person is driving slowly (they are looking for a street). Perhaps writing a check helps someone to keep track of their expenditures. Patience with others is a key element in harmonious relationships.

One of the hardest areas in which to be patient is waiting for God. We know that things are supposed to happen on God's time and in God's way. But how often do we take matters in our own hands when we should be patient? We are often told to pray for what we want, but to expect that occasionally God will say "no" or "not yet". We don't want to say, "OK, I'll wait". We want things now, not later. When things don't happen according to our expectations, we have a tendency to just give up. The phrase "let go and let God" comes to mind. OK, I'll turn this situation over to you, Lord. Then later we find ourselves manipulating the situation in order to get a quicker solution. That's kind of like taking it back out of God's hands.

Impatience is a good thing to give up for Lent. In fact, giving up being impatient is a good thing to just get rid of altogether. It's human nature to be impatient; to be unwilling to give up control of things. But that's what God actually wants us to do. Controlling certain situations can help us in our daily living. But there are also times when we really need to let go this need for control. We need to allow our confidence in Him to overwhelm the impatience. Then peace can take the place of impatience in our lives.
