"Because I said so." For some reason, I got the impression that this was a bad thing for a parent to say to a child. The "progressive" childrearing theories of the 1970's and '80's mandated that you explain to your child exactly why you were asking them to do. Then the child learns to adopt the correct behavior while at the same time knowing the logic of the

behavior. What these researchers failed to take into consideration was that children don't necessarily think before they act. They are generally creatures of impulse and require adults to do the thinking for them. That is why as they get older, they can handle more responsibility for independent decision making. Those are the years when "because I said so" changes to "remember what I told you". ("Because I said so" comes after the 3rd or 4th come on, Mom, pleeese.) Personally, I was blessed with a mother who wouldn't tolerate much debate on such things. After a couple of attempts to change her mind, she would simply say, "Well, go ahead." That's it. But it wasn't really permission. What she meant was, "Go ahead. But it's a big mistake and I tried to tell you but you wouldn't listen. You'll pay the price in the end." I always ended up doing it her way and, oddly enough, she was always right in her decision. When it came right down to it, I trusted her. I knew she was looking out for my best interests even when I couldn't see past my own face. I knew she had experiences that I hadn't. I didn't always like the boundaries she set for me, but I trusted her.

Trust. It's a small but powerful word. It is crucial in every significant relationship in our lives. When you look for the definition of the word "trust", you come across words like truth, honor, hope, reliability, care and obligation. In normal parenting situations, the child trusts the parent to protect and love them. In friendships, the friends trust each other for emotional support and understanding. In a marriage, trust can determine its success or failure. In each of these scenarios trust can be broken, and once that happens it is nearly impossible to bring the relationship back to its most stable state. We should be able to trust the important people in our lives but we are so often disappointed. Why? Because we're flawed, all of us. On the up side, we get a lot of practice forgiving people, right?

We can trust God without reservation and as Christians, we should know this. He is flawless. He has never let us down. He is always caring for us. "Because I said so" should be enough. Our trust in Him should be unwavering, constant. We don't need to know why He asks certain things of us. Yet it seems to be something that challenges us every day whether we realize it or not. Most of our decisions are made on the basis of what we want, not what God wants. We don't think through the things we say in terms of being a Christian example. Or we figure that even though God tells us not to do something, we can't see that it will hurt anybody so we do it anyway. If we trust Him to be who He says He is, then anything He says is true and right. Always. Without a doubt. Without hesitation. Now that's something worth trusting. *Submitted by Linda Wheeler*
